In the following digest of data received Your Secretary has made a conscientious effort to determine the source of the original story, from its context, divorced from semantics. As a former reporter, former publicity man, advertising man and sometime master of word-twistery, he feels rather competent to take the syntax apart.

The digest is divided into three sections. 1. Objects the papers called "saucers". 2. Objects the paper called "meteors". 3. Objects the papers did not know what to call, but refrained from calling either "saucers" or "meteors".

Some duplication may have crept in, but the aim has been to supplement the "saucer" data which appeared in DOUBT No. 23, No. 24, and No. 27, and to bring it up to date.

The statement is that "flying saucers" or "flying discs" or "flying disks" were the subject of "news" stories as follows:

1947 = 17 FS

July 4. Cincinnati Enquirer, UP. Reference is to a letter in the San Francisco Chronicle, signed Ole. J. Sneide, alleging that the "saucers" were "space ships from older planets".

July 10, Cincinnati Times-Star, AP. Man named

Long in Van Nuys, Calif., found something in his garden.

Same date, INS, New York. Walter Winchell is quoted in favor of "belief". Alleged that something "went though the supersonic wall where it was traveling in space ahead of itself".

Aug 29. Two staff members of the Cincinnati Enquirer reported lights in the sky. The news services appear not to have picked the story up for their member-papers.

Nov. Amazing Stories, on its back cover, cites a sighting off Cape Race, Nov. 12, 1887.

July 25, UP. Philadelphia Bulletin and Philadelphia Inquirer, referred to what was reported in Atlanta, Ga., by two Eastern Air Line pilots. The same story, reported by AP, was in the Victoria, British Columbia, Daily Times the previous day. It was sent to us by Kenneth Arnold (MFS).

July 26, Los Angeles Daily News, ran a UP follow-up story, complete with posed Acme photo.

October 3, Idaho Sunday Statesman, Boise printed an AP despatch from Fargo, N.D. The story was reported by "a National Guard fighter pilot", and it was sent to us by Kenneth Arnold (MFS).

1949 = 19 FS

Jan 3 Seattle Times editorialized on the coincidence the the Saturday Evening Post and True Magazine had published "saucer" stories simultaneously with pronouncements from "The Army Air Force".

Jan 23. "Special" to Portland or Astoria, Oregon, or Seattle, Wash., paper. Tillamook (Oregon) dateline. Local people saw "saucer". Story not picked up by news services.

Jan 31. Orlando (Fla) Evening Star, by-line of John M. Fleming. The news services did not pick

it up.

Mar 8. AP. Seen near Klamath Falls (Oregon). Mar 11. San Bernardino Daily Sun. Local people saw. News services did not pick up.

Mar t2. AP. Washington, D.C. The "armed services" (branch unspecified) has classified saucer data "along with information on atomic bombs and guided missiles".

Is everybody shuddering?

Mar 13. Minneapolis *Tribune*. Describes what would have been called a "meteor", seen locally, and wraps the story around the above squib about the "armed services" clamming up.

Mar 20. Eight days after it was handed out, the

Mar 20. Eight days after it was handed out, the Wyoming State Tribune just got around to printing the fright piece from Washington.

April 3. A correspondent writing to the Minne-

apolis Tribune mentioned Charles Fort.

April 7. Washington, D. C. "The Air Force" clamped on more secrecy, and went to the trouble of telling INS, and the NYT (who told the Dallas, Texas, *Times-Herald* and God knows whom else) how quiet it was going to keep this stuff.

May. The Minneapolis Star editorialized upon

Walter Winchell (said to favor a Russ source) and BSRA (the crowd of spirit-communers in Calif which publishes double-talk about life on "other planes", not meaning airplanes, but levels of immateriality).

May 20. Pueblo Colo. Star-Journal. Sighting.

July 16. Chicago Tribune. Local viewers. Press services did not pick up.

July 24. Boise, Idaho. AP. Seven in formation. (This is in DOUBT No. 27, p. 416.)

July 28. Seattle Post-Intelligencer, UP. Seen near Puyallup, Wash. May or may not be same one reported in DOUBT No. 27, as seen in Burien, Wash.

Aug 31. The Chicago Tribune printed the AP yarn with its Los Angeles dateline of Aug 30, which is in DOUBT No. 27, p. 417, as "seen Aug 26". Officers of the White Sands, N.M., "proving grounds" gave out the story.

Sept 7. Los Angeles Examiner, also the Times. First peep of La Paz, climbing aboard the bandwagon. He was speaking to U of SC, and tied 'saucers' to "meteors" so that confusion reigned in almost all reports for about two years.

Oct 3. Saratogian, Saratoga, N.Y. By-line of Charles W. Andrews. Story was not picked up by press services.

Oct 15. U of Minnesota Daily. An "explanation" over by-line of Duane Rasmussen.

Oct 15. AP and UP, Williamsport, Pa., dateline. "An Army officer today said . . . " etc.

Oct 18. AP. Omaha, Neb., dateline. "Lt so and so

and so, said he saw . . . " etc. Undated piece of a few days later reports "mysterious objects over Troy, N.Y. It was not picked up by news services.

Oct 31. AP Los Angeles. "A weird comet-like aircraft" reported by a pilot.

Nov 15. Buffalo Courier-Express, in Rollin Palmer's column. Bandwagon.

December issue, American Astrology Magazine, 21, a letter, "personal experience of an aviator with a flying disk in mid-air".

Dec. 12. UP, Victoria, B.C.

Dec 16. Seattle Post-Intelligencer. INS follow-up on the incident of Dec. 12.

Dec 22. AP, Indianapolis. Radio commentator Frank Edwards is quoted.

Then came KEYHOE.

Anyone who wishes may read, The Flying Saucers ure Real, in the January, 1950, issue of True Magezine. Both AP and UP sent out long stories, digesting the article, and their member papers published it widely, Dec 27 and 28.

it was dropping the investigation "after checking

Dec 30. Charlotte, N.C. Local sighting reported, plus AP stories from Asheville, Albemarle, and Columbia, S.C.

Feb (?) Los Angeles Daily News. Columnist Matt Weinstock scotfs at the story that an experimental balloon, sent up with a camera attached, photographed a space ship away up there.

Feb 23. UP, Santiago, Chile. A commander in the Chilean Navy claimed to have photos. Not reproduced in the Seattle Times.

Feb 23. INS. New York. Commander Robert B. McLaughlin of the USN is quoted. His article was in True Magazine.

Feb 23. AP, New York. Sent a digest of the same article to its member papers. Much is made of "sighting" near White Sands.

Reuters and UP also picked it up. It went around the world.

Feb. 27. Venice, Italy. Reuters. Disk over Caioggia. Feb 28. Seattle Times, debunks story which it asserts was widely disseminated, but the debunking is the first record we have of it.

Feb 28. UP, Cambridge, Mass. Routine report by

Shapley of an object visible only in telescopes, but headlined by the N. Y. Times: "Strange, Fast What-Is-It Sighted in Northern Sky."

Mar 9. Ray L. Dimmick's story of the little man killed in a saucer-crash began in the Los Angeles Mirorr. It was picked up by INS, AP, UP, and was printed everywhere for three days, with alterations by Dimmick, some double-talk by spokesmen for the Mexican government, some credulity by Navy men and others.

In Denver, a U of Denver "basic science" class was addressed by a "saucer expert" provided for the occasion by a radio time salesman name George T. Kochler. Watch for that "expert". He turns up again.
